A Message from Pastor Leigh



Dear Ones of VPC:

A few months before Olde John Croan died, he invited me to his house to watch a recording of him talking about his time in WWII. We sat downstairs, eating ice cream on tv snack trays and watching the video together. Periodically I would look over at him and he would be nodding his head in agreement about the words he was saying on the video. He was beginning to struggle to find his words in life, but he could follow everything he was saying on the television.

After the video finished, he and I both were crying and I asked him if what we had just watched was what he had been trying to share with me, something he couldn't ever forget. He had once jumped from an airplane with several of his friends on a training mission in Alaska during the war. The plane was having problems and they each agreed that the good news was they would be allowed to keep the parachute. They would each send it home to their moms with a letter saying they were okay. This was something these still-teenagers had been told in basic training.

After they jumped from the plane, Olde John landed, began to gather up his parachute and look for his friends. None of their shoots had deployed quickly enough and they had each hit the ground too hard for survival. Olde John took his parachute, sent a letter to his mom and continued serving in the war, never receiving any follow-up therapy or conversation.

Now, all those years later, he sat in his living room with his pastor, both in tears. I dried my eyes and put my hand on his arm and said, "Olde John, I can't imagine how hard that was; you were so young. I am so very sorry you had to go through that." He nodded in agreement. "You must think about them every day." He nodded again. We sat together for a long time afterwards. He'd been carrying that story for so long, only telling it a few times.

Human beings go through life carrying stories. Some we share, some we keep close to us, but many stay with us all our lives.

As I reflect on what it must have been like to be with Jesus during his days on earth, I wonder if folks didn't share those deep stories with him, because it was safe, because someone could make the space for them. It's never lost on me that Jesus simply listened.

That's what I see in God's beloved community: safe space, to be heard, to have someone say, "I'm sorry; that must have been so hard." And friends, it's part of our call.

I pray that we continue to make that space for one another and for others. Walking through the door of any church is hard for many folks for so many reasons. Creating the safest possible welcome and acceptance is the work of being disciples. We can never know the story someone else carries with them, but we can welcome, and we can listen without judgment, and we can just be with them.

Because where two or more are gathered, God is in their midst.

Minutes of the monthly Session meetings are available upon request. Highlights from the August meeting include:

- Pastor Leigh was elected by the Presbytery to attend the 226th General Assembly in June 2024.
- Regular offerings and building users donations are exceeding 2023 budget expectations. Session continues working on the 2024 budget.
- The Planning Committee has received a security review prepared by Matt Lilje of the Seattle Police Department following his October 8 premises inspection and presentation.

- A congregational meeting will be held December 10 following worship to approve revised Terms of Call for Pastor Leigh and elect church officers whose terms will commence Jan 1, 2024.

Building and Grounds

New flooring and an upgraded toilet and sink have been installed in the Narthex bathroom. Painting will be the next step in this remodeling project. We also still need to install baseboards in the kitchen and hallways. Both projects will be available during November's Second Saturday work party on November 11.

If the weather is nice there will also be a few leaves to rake and maybe some trash to pick up around the parking lot for those who prefer outdoor activities. Please plan to join us at 9:00 AM in preparation for the Harvest Dinner that evening.

If you cannot attend the work party, there are also opportunities for carpentry repairs and painting that can be done at your convenience. Pastor Leigh's office door needs to be stained. The front door, library table, and communion table still need to be sanded and stained, and the wooden fence separating VPC's front lawn from Zamorano's' dining area needs to be replaced. If you are experienced in carpentry or in sanding and staining, please contact me and we will work out a plan.

All parking lot catch basins and the North retention pond were cleaned out on October 6 in response to a worklist provided by King County Surface Water Management inspectors. There are additional items on the worklist which will need to be accomplished by the end of November. See me for details if interested.

A new water fountain and bottle filling station has been purchased and will be installed during the Christmas break in Carpe Diem classes. We will leave that one up to a plumber.

Worship

I've been reading and thinking about outdoor church this summer, perhaps to the detriment of promoting our Sunday morning service. When I look at the Sunday service, however, it has been received so positively, both on Zoom and in person, that I feel that it speaks for itself.....or God is speaking to us through Pastor Leigh and the service inspiringly, especially to our traditional congregation......But I just keep coming back to the question, "Who's not here?"

I think of the many friends and associates who don't want to participate in the church as they remember it from childhood. They have been released and actually protested the institutional, corporate world to the extent that they don't want the "institutional" God presented in the church. This image exists, despite God's efforts to be personal and relational, and gets even more defined by committees, egos, and personal achievements or problems. It's these non-churched community members whom I find going to the mountains for a hike or simply a beach walk on Sunday morning. This allows the escape from others' expectations and gives a spiritual high of sorts but then a feeling of isolation. People are relational. They want to share these good God-given feelings.

So I'm back reading about how to bring together these people grounded in the beauty of God's natural world. There are many groups assembled around their love of the outdoors but there is one I've discovered in my reading who has faith in God and Christ's message but has been exploring worship from a different view. The first article I read was entitled "Wild Churches; Returning to Nature as a Spiritual Practice" You can read extensively about the "movement" and growth of the these loosely-connected churches at <u>www.wildchurchnetwork.com</u>.

While diverse in expression, style, and particulars of theology, they share a united sense of calling, purpose and rootedness in the earth as sacred and alive.

A supper meeting was held to explore ideas of outdoor church. Al and Claudia Ross Weston, John and Nancy Williams, Thomas Abraham and Liz Loveness were present.

- 1. We discussed the loosely connected member churches of the Wild Church Network.
- 2. We agreed to acquire the books recommended on their bibliography, especially <u>Braiding</u> <u>Sweetgrass</u>, for our church library.
- 3. We will download the Wild Church Lectionary and Communion Liturgy for further evaluation.
- 4. It was noted that the Lutheran Church has already prescribed a "wild" liturgy and the Presbyterian Church will be doing the same next summer. These are different than the ones put forth by the Wild Church Network. It will be interesting to compare.

Purposeful Service Team

Areas of Responsibility Scholarships, Mary's Place partnership, IFCH, Mission Partner Relations

November 5 is Food Bank Sunday. Bring your items to the worship service or to the church office. Canned tuna, peanut butter, any type of pasta, and chicken or vegetable broth are always appreciated. Also needed are donations of cooking oil and condiments such as ketchup, salsa, A-1 or other "steak" sauce, mustards, etc., and people may bring personal hygiene items such as toothbrushes and toothpaste. There is also a need for pet food. For donations of bulk pet food, volunteers from VIPP will break down and repackage for individual distribution.

One of the VPC Mission Partners is Presbyterian Disaster Assistance. As the name implies, this is the national Presbyterian program that aids in responding to natural disasters and human caused situations resulting from conflict and migration.

In 2022 PDA issued 85 grants associated with natural disasters and 20 grants for refugee/migrant causes in the United States, totaling nearly \$1.5 million. Internationally, PDA responded to disasters in 35 other countries, with expenditures of \$1.6 million. PDA also sends volunteers to assist with recovery in areas affected by disasters. Part of the annual One Great Hour of Sharing collection during Lent, which VPC supports, goes to PDA. Recognizing the need to support PDA beyond that contribution, the VPC Session this year approved two donations to PDA of \$1,000 each, with one of those directed specifically to relief efforts in Gaza.

We are awaiting information as to expanded recycling opportunities at the county landfill, but for now plastic bags and Styrofoam, along with other goods, are being collected on Vashon for a charge by a private company. Contact Bev Skeffington or Bob Spangler for further information.
