Safe Conduct Policy Update

As required by VPC's Safe Conduct Policy, criminal background checks have been conducted successfully on all newly installed as well as returning elders and deacons.

The next step in Policy implementation will be the training of these leaders, as well as all other volunteers working with children or vulnerable adults. Training will be conducted following a curriculum of online courses developed and administered by Praesidium, a resource recommended to VPC by the Insurance Board, our liability insurance carrier.

VPC's Moderators of session and deacons as well as appropriate Mission Team Leaders are responsible for the completion of the training requirements by elders, deacons and volunteers respectively. Kathy Olsen, VPC's Safe Conduct Policy Administrator will coordinate course enrollment. Training will begin in earnest in April.

While all of this is new for VPC, we have learned other congregations commonly follow these steps and we are adapting our processes accordingly, based on the best practices of others.

In all of this effort, the broad Statement of Purpose of our Safe Conduct Policy guides us:

As a community of Christian faith, VPC is committed to creating and maintaining programs, facilities and a community in which members, friends, staff and volunteers can worship, learn and work together in an atmosphere free from all forms of discrimination, harassment, exploitation or intimidation.

Your patience and understanding is appreciated as we move forward. Further updates will appear in this Newsletter as other aspects of our Safe Conduct Policy are implemented. Please seek out a lay leader if you have questions or suggestions.

Appreciative Enquiry

Carol Potter and Kathy Olson reported on the results of their collation of the Appreciative Enquiry interviews. Of the 88 persons who were identified as congregants, 68 agreed to be interviewed. The six questions of the Appreciative Enquiry were general in nature and designed to elicit responses without prompting so the answers were quite broad in their scope, but the collation had some clear threads: that our church provides fellowship, friendship and a Christian community was by far the most frequent positive response. There were issues and concerns revealed by the survey that will need to be addressed by the Session and session committees Some immediate issues are being processed by specific mission-team elders and Session at upcoming meetings. A broader vision and addressing long term concerns will be discussed at a special Session workshop on leadership set for April 11th. The recommendations of our leaders from this workshop and their review of the Appreciative Enquiry will be the subject of our next Congregational Conversation set for April 19th.

Rev. Dan's Message...

Giving Up Fear- A Mediation for Lent

"'Peace! Be Still!' he said, Then the wind ceased, and there was a great calm" – Mark 4:39

Recently one of our congregation shared with me her choice of what she'd give up for Lent this winter. "Fear!" I am both captivated and intrigued.

Isn't the purpose of fasting to put aside things that distract from focus on God? Wouldn't focusing on our fears as the object of fasting possibly distract from focus on God? Or is there a healthy way to address our fears that might lead us closer to God?

The story of Jesus calming the storm (Mark 4:35-41) has become instructive. Jesus was asleep on a cushion in the stern of the boat as it was being wracked by a storm. The disciples woke him terrified. "Teacher, don't you care that we are perishing?" And he responded to their fearful, angry question, with a miracle of "great calm."

I'm indebted to my friend and colleague Doug Bunnell at First Presbyterian Bellingham for pointing out that Jesus didn't stop with that storm, but went on to address the storm of fear within his disciples. He did this via two questions:

"Why are you afraid? Have you no faith?".

I believe these questions are not rhetorical, but are serious invitations to reflection and freedom. Notice how they follow a natural progression; for connected to any fear is a "why" of belief, an article of faith. A perfectionist, for example, fears doing something wrong, and usually expresses his or her fear in impatience with themself or with others who could "mess it all up."

If someone dared ask "Why are you afraid?" and the perfectionist actually reflected a bit and answered, it might go something like, "Well, if I don't do this just right, then (insert most horrible and shameful consequences imaginable here)..." Imbalanced as the belief may be, it is what he is putting his weight upon, and that's what's rocking his boat, and rarely just his boat alone.

Lent's de-cluttering can get us alone in the boat with our true fears, to face them without hiding behind our favorite tranquilizers. Now why would a sane person choose to do that, except perhaps to find to find a greater tranquility? Even so, what could induce anyone to sail into such storms alone? Wild horses wouldn't drag me to the ramp; though with a good friend I might just climb aboard. One heck of a good friend.

"And they were filled with great awe and said to one another, who then is this, that even the wind and the sea obey him?"

Who indeed, but the one who has already climbed in our boat: Jesus Christ. In the teeth of the storm he is found to be more than just a teacher, more than a guru of feel-good platitudes, more than just a good friend.

This one alone—"conquered fear, captured it and led it away in a victory parade, nailed it to the cross and banished it to nothingness. He alone is Lord of fear, it knows him and yields to him alone. Therefore, look to him in your fear. Think about him, place him before your eyes and call him. Pray to him and believe his is now with you and helps you. The fear will yield and fade, and you will become free through faith in the strong and living Jesus Christ" - Dietrich Bonhoeffer.

What a friend we have in Jesus. All our sins and griefs to bear. And fears. Truly. As you carry these things to him, may he carry you into the great calm of his peace, now and always. Dan

Financial Stewardship - The mission resource task force was commissioned by Session to make a recommendation on the feasibility and likelihood of success of a capital campaign to reduce the mortgage. Purposeful Service News

Area of Responsibility:

Scholarship, Mary Magdalene weekend/partnership, IFCH dinners, mission partner relations.

At the Deacons' request, Purposeful Service Team will take over collection and distribution of food to the foodbank. We will continue to collect donations of food on Communion Sunday, the First Sunday of each month and deliver them to the foodbank on the following Monday.

Email Etiquette Policy for Vashon Presbyterian Church Adopted by the VPC Session February 16, 2015

Email can be a powerful tool for communication and is generally a time saving practice. However, we place a great value on maintaining close and positive relationships within our church family. Most of us have heard of the horror stories of email communications going awry and we would like to prevent this from happening at VPC.

Although there is a list of "dos and don'ts" below, these will usually be unnecessary if a few principles are kept in mind:

- -The email author should reflect an attitude of humility and gentleness toward others who may differ in their views and understanding. (Rom 14:19)
- -Do not violate any confidences, be circumspect at all times, avoid any hint of gossip or slander. (Proverbs 11:13)
- -The best practice when deciding whether or not to send an email is: "When in doubt, talk it out."

Inappropriate Use of Emails Includes:

- -Any action or intention to harm others, gossip or threaten the unity of the Body of Christ.
- -Emotionally charged issues.
- -Conflicts or complaints against others or programming.
- -Sharing of 'concerns' that may reflect poorly on others whether intentionally or unintentionally.
- -Forwarding emails with the intent (or result) of building a case against someone or trying to make them look bad.
- -Forwarding is often damaging because it separates the email from the context of the broader discussion and thereby changes how the message will come across or be understood.
- Forwarding often violates the principle of allowing others to speak for themselves.
- -Attempting to speak for others.
- Blind Carbon Copying (BCC).

Appropriate Use of Emails Includes:

Rather than trying to list all of the appropriate uses of email (there are many!), we ask you to keep in mind the guidelines listed above and if you find yourself writing an email that falls into one of these categories, please pray about it and pick up the phone instead!

Clerk's Corner

The VPC session held its February meeting on the Monday, the 16th, with all members attending. Session received reports from the various teams and committees. Among the actions taken were the decision to participate in the 2015 One Great Hour of Sharing collection, and the adoption of best practices for using email in correspondence among members. Session discussed the need to respond to a member's inquiry about the worship service, and the need to provide child care by adults who have undergone security clearances. A group of session members will address each of these matters. Session scheduled a special meeting in March to consider the large amount of information submitted by members in the appreciative enquiry and the pastor's evaluation. A congregational conversation will be held following that meeting to share that information. Another possible event which was discussed was a congregational retreat near the end of summer. Finally, Jacq explained Seattle Presbytery's recent vote to approve proposed revisions to the Book of Order that would allow PCUSA ministers to conduct same sex marriages. 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This is the primary call of God that creates and defines the church. We bear authentic witness to God's love when we demonstrate Jesus-following lives. But too often, we don't. The gift we are meant to be is neither available nor received. Meanwhile the world needs a church that actually lives its call. Urgently.

We will not resolve the crisis from inside the church by devising improved techniques to address denominational disharmony, declining brand loyalty, physical and financial decay, and other alarming trends. That would be like offering swimming lessons in an empty pool. We will not resolve the crisis by personal renewal alone, by asking "What is God's call on my life?". The question is earnest but individualistic, often neglecting the shared vocation for the people of God. We can recenter our lives on Jesus Christ, whose call is to "live differently." Whatever our context, our work, our relationships-that is the primary thing we are to be
