An Undivided Heart

On Memorial Day, and Newsletter Deadline Day, Psalm 86: 11 was listed as the "Scripture for the Day" in an email I get every morning. No commentary included, just a verse for contemplation.

Teach me your way, O Lord,

that I may walk in your truth; give me an *undivided* heart to revere your name.



An *undivided heart*. I've always been drawn to that concept, and struggled with it. Should I retire or not? Should I go to General Assembly or stay home and celebrate my birthday with family? Should I urge my mom to move out of the house she has lived in for 60 years, or support her decision to stay in her own home? Should we as a congregation choose this course of action or that course of action during this time of transition? And when people differ in what they think, how do we avoid conflict? It seems my heart is often pulled in *at least* two different directions. Can we avoid such ambivalence, such divisions in this life? Is there something God teaches us that would prevent such struggles?

As I thought about this verse I came to the conclusion that it cannot be talking about having no ambivalence about one course of action or the other. We can never avoid that, can we? It probably does not even mean that God always prefers one course over the other, though God definitely has preferences in some circumstances. Ambivalence and divisions seem inevitable even within each individual, let alone in community decision making.

In reality, Psalm 86: 11 is about having <u>no ambivalence of purpose</u>. It is about having a heart that is clear about whom it serves. It is a heart giving full devotion to God above all else. It is about David calling out to God as his enemies seek to harm him. In verse 2-4 he pleads "Guard my life, for I am devoted to you. You are my God; save your servant who trusts in you. Gladden the soul of your servant, for you, O Lord, I lift up my soul."

An undivided heart, which seeks first and always to be true to God, is what we need as a congregation as we move into the future. Join me in praying for such a heart over the next several months, that at the end of the day, no matter what course we take together, we might be as One – heart, mind and soul. Being united in such a prayer will make all the difference as we seek to revere and serve God alone.

10 predictions about the future Church and shifting attendance patterns

Every generation experiences change.

But sometimes you sense you're in the midst of truly radical change, the kind that happens only every few centuries. Increasingly, I think we're in such a moment now.

Those of us in in Western culture who are over age 30 were born into a culture that could conceivably still be called Christian. Now, as David Kinnaman at the Barna Group has shown, even in America, people who are churchless (having no church affiliation) will soon eclipse the churched.

In addition, 48% of Millennials (born between 1984-2002) can be called post-Christian in their beliefs, thinking and worldview.

I think the change we're seeing around us might one day be viewed on the same level as what happened to the church after Constantine's conversion or after the invention of the printing press. Whatever the change looks like when it's done, it will register as a seismic shift from what we've known.

So what will the future church be like? And how should you and I respond?

Session also authorized a congregational conversation to be held on May 22 following worship, and elected a committee to audit the 2015 financial results. Jacq reported on the matters considered at the April Seattle Presbytery meeting held in Poulsbo. Finally, session discussed whether to establish a reserve fund to cover expenses in the event of a drop in income; this issue will be considered when the 2017 budget is prepared.

Mary's Place Housing

I had the grand pleasure to go to the Open House at the former Travelodge in Seattle, which was purchased and remodeled by Amazon and donated to Mary's Place. It is located at 2213 8th Avenue.

There are 200 beds available in this three story building. Many of the rooms are designed to house a 3 person family unit and beds can be put together or apart as fits the needs of that family. These families are allowed to have pets and each room has it's own bathroom with shower. This system allows for multi generational living as well. The rooms are clean and freshly painted and are decorated with bright linens.

There are a few public spaces on the first floor: one for dining (usually the donated meals are set up buffet style and there is another room adjacent for seating for dining.), There is a large laundry room and storage room for grocery items (diapers, cereal and other food). They have a room they call "Bon Mary" (Their version of the Bon Marche), where they can purchase items (new or gently used clothing, diapers, snacks, etc) with points they have earned by doing work around the facility. Each person is encouraged to do at least 3 hours/week of work.

When people move into this facility, they begin a plan for future goals for leaving it (this is not permanent housing, but transitional) and they must show evidence of moving toward those goals in concrete ways.

I met a woman who is an interpreter for Amazon and part of her participation in this facility is to volunteer her translation services to the residents. She speaks 7 languages!

Currently they have 125 beds (out of the 200) occupied, after only having been open for one week.

What a great feeling to be there and to meet these residents; to experience their joy and sense of dignity.
