Dear Ones of VPC,

Someone recently asked me if my commute ever gets old. I shared that waiting at Fauntleroy on Fridays borders on old but only occasionally. What people who commute by ferry and all islanders learn is there is a public library ready to fill your waiting. And so, thanks to my commute, I'm better read than I've been in years and I'm grateful for times of waiting.

Lent is a time of waiting, of preparing. It's a time of waiting for a story to unfold that we all know, hope, love, betrayal, suffering, fear, abandonment, death and eventually resurrection. One of the books I've been reading lately is by theologian Shelly Rambo. Her book <u>Spirit and Trauma: A Theology of Remaining</u> has a quotation that I value:

"The pressure to get over, to forget, to wipe away the past, is often reinforced by one particular way of reading Christian redemption. The narrative of triumphant resurrection can often operate in such a way as to promise a radically new beginning to those who have experienced a devastating event. A linear reading of cross and resurrection places death and life in a continuum; death is behind, and life is ahead; life emerges victoriously from death. This way of reading can, at its best, provide a sense of hope and promise for the future. But it can also gloss over the realities of pain and loss, glorify suffering and justify violence."

I've been wrestling with her statement for a while now, largely because I hear its truth. I suspect many of us look forward to Easter Sunday. It's a joyous time of triumph and proclamation that death has no hold on us any longer. And while that is true, I wonder if it isn't also important to honor this season of waiting and the week that we, in the Church, call Holy. Jesus lived through all of that and it hurt. In the garden he pleaded for another way, on the cross he cried out in pain. He spoke truth to power and stood by those on the margins even when he could see where it was leading and the people around him, his friends, fell asleep.

Lent and this season of Easter Sunday offer each of us an opportunity not only to take on some kind of spiritual discipline but also to acknowledge that life offers both difficult times of trauma as well as hope and resurrection. We experience both as human beings. Jesus experienced both. What Jesus also offers us is the reminder that God is always with us and life eternal is ours through him. God knows what we carry deep in our hearts and God holds that with us. So, as we walk through this season together, let us honor both, the promise and hope of resurrection and the presence of the Holy in all that we experience.

I thank God for each of you every day and cherish our shared journey.

February Presbytery Meeting Report

I attended the stated meeting of Seattle Presbytery
February 25th at Northminster PC in Ballard, actually
hosted by Coastland Commons, a new worshiping
community utilizing Northminster PC space. As
Eliana Maxim, Co-Executive Presbyter put it "We're
attempting a new way in doing our meetings as a
presbytery." It was truly the most unique Presbytery
meeting that I've attended. Rather than repeat
what's available on line I'll note highlights only.
The entire meeting was videotaped and portions
are now available on the Presbytery of Seattle
website. We spent the entire first hour of the meeting
in guided meditation, song and prayer.

In the business session after dinner: Seattle First Presbyterian Church Updates Property Update:

The property is under contract with a buyer and we are hopeful this will result in a sale by sometime mid 2020 or later. Plans are underway to find new homes for some of Seattle First's physical assets (organs, pianos, chairs, books, etc).

Legal Update:

On October 7, 2019, the Washington Court of Appeals issued a decision in favor of Seattle Presbytery and First Presbyterian Church of Seattle, rejecting all arguments made by the former copastors and ruling elders of First Pres.

General Assembly Overture (Fossil Free PCUSA Divestment) - from the session of Woodland Park Presbyterian Church: *Resolved*, that the presbytery concur with overture 13.

General Assembly Overture – Resolved, that the Presbytery of Seattle overture the 223 General Assembly to continue supporting the work promoting peace and justice with the Presbyterian Church of Colombia.

Forty Acts of Kindness

"No act of kindness, no matter how small, is ever wasted." Aesop

The rainy, dreary days of "Februweary" are (finally!) over. Enter March, with its eagerly-awaited promise of spring, regeneration, and renewal. March also contains a highly spiritual essence, comprising the vast majority of days in the Lenten season.

Lent is a season of reflection and preparation before the celebrations of Easter. By observing the 40 days of Lent, we symbolically emulate Christ's sacrifice and withdrawal into the desert for 40 days. Very few of us actually retreat into a desert and give up food for 40 days, but typically we do focus on some sort of sacrifice. During Lent we might give up certain foods or beverages, activities, or bad habits. Typically we concentrate on things we won't do, pleasures we will forego or tendencies we will strive to curb. But what about if we also focus on positive things we will do? This is hardly a new idea, and it is a Yang to the Yin of self-sacrifice.

How about engaging in a deliberate act of kindness each day during Lent? There is no size limit to kindness—any benevolence, even just a deliberate smile to a stranger, can make a difference to a struggling soul. And this is one of the most exciting aspects of kindly acts: only God will know how many seeds of hope and joy they will plant in the lives of others and those around them. This represents the essence of selfless giving – to do so without expectation of recognition or reward.

GREEN TIP FOR MARCH:

We are all very excited about getting on board and making changers to the way we consume. However, please don't go on a sweep of your home and throw everything into the land fill at once. As things wear out, make a smarter purchase. For instance, when your plastic broom and dustpan break, replace with a wooden handle straw broom and metal dust pan. When you are ready to replace the plastic scrubber you use around the sink or that double edged sponge. purchase wooden handled brush with natural bristles or if you can't find the natural bristles, when it is no longer good, cut the bristles and store them in a small container and when you have filled that container with microfiber items such as these, put it in the trash that is headed for the transfer station. It is important to keep those items of microfibers or microtrash fully contained as they can easily be airborne and make their way to our waters.
