#### Dear Ones of VPC,

Recently in a conversation with my son, he and I reflected on how we were living through history. Future generations will talk about this pandemic and you and I will be recorded as having lived during this time. But for the daily living of this time, it doesn't always feel like history as much as just work. We mask up to go everywhere. We keep social distance, and we wash our hands more than ever before. And I suspect all of us are more than ready for it to end.

I've been thinking a lot lately about the people of Israel during the Babylonian exile. Jewish and Christian history record this time as life changing. Scripture devotes a good amount of text to telling that story. It DID get better, they DID return home, but they were changed and the home to which they returned was equally changed. Day to day life for the Israelites during that time was hard. They lived in a foreign land and had to work to keep their practices alive in new and creative ways. That's the part of their story that encourages me in these days.


Human beings find a way. People of God find ways to be creative and keep their faith alive even when circumstances around them change. The draw to gather together, the thirst to worship, to be in community as God's people is a strong one on our spirits. And times of exile remind and record for us that truth.

These are definitely hard days, but you and I remain close. We haven't worshipped in our sanctuary in months, but we do worship. We study together and pray together and do the work of the church together in new and creative ways.

Yes, we are living through history, but the history of our faith teaches us that we belong to God and to one another and that we will find our way through this time while still being the church. That is why we study scripture together, to remember who we are and Whose we are, claimed and named. And it is God that tethers us to one another.

I thank God for you, your creativity, your spirits, and your grace. You encourage me.

In the entire chronicling of history, there has never been a Father Time more eager to turn over his hourglass to Baby New Year than Father Time 2020. And we're happy for him to; "Good riddance!" we say. But unfortunately for us, even though Father Time is no longer on the clock with the burdens of 2020, we are left with them and must somehow navigate our way into this new year.

In 2020 we saw too much dying, weeping, mourning, and refraining from embracing. But the Bible reminds us that there is a season for everything. Could 2021 be the year of birth, laughter, dance and embracing? We hope so. We pray so. And, we wait.

A technique I picked up on the Internet looks promising. The "Five by Five" rule states: If it won't matter in five years, don't spend more than five minutes being upset by it. How much anxiety have we poured into 2020 over trivia such as social media commentaries and other people's political views, to name only two. Maybe we can lighten our own burdens in 2021 if we commit to holding on to our joy, our peace, and if we refuse to give power to those who would take it away.

While seasons change, God's promises endure. He has pledged to relieve us of our heavy burdens. Through acts of self-kindness, self-forgiveness, and, self-forgetfulness in ministering to others, we can lighten the weight of that burden and make 2021 a season of healing.

Purposeful Service publicized three offerings in December, albeit in a manner different from past years. Rather than VPC receiving a Christmas Eve service collection, the committee recommended, and session agreed, that people would be asked to donate to a charity of their choice. Also, the traditional Mary's Place tree with gift tags was replaced with a request that the congregation either send a gift directly to Mary's Place from its online list, or order an item from the online wish list at Amazon or Target. Finally, we publicized the Presbyterian Mission Agency Giving Catalog by providing a link, because we were unable to distribute copies of the printed catalog.

The December Styrofoam recycling event was cancelled, but people were encouraged to take items on January 3.

We are committed to continuing and hopefully expanding the Purposeful Service programs in 2021, adjusting to the restrictions that exist at the time.

### Clerk's Corner

There will be a short Congregational Meeting before the worship service Sunday January 3<sup>rd</sup> to re-elect Elder Elizabeth Loveness. Then there will be the Installation of Deacons and Elders during the worship service.

Session held its monthly meeting December 15<sup>th</sup> via ZOOM with all Elders present. Pastor Leigh opened the meeting with a meditation and prayer. Claudia Ross-Weston, the incoming moderator of deacons, joined briefly to report on Deacons activities and concerns. We received letter of thanks from IFCH for \$500.00 donation in November. Pastor Leigh reported that she has continued socially distant pastoral care, coming to Vashon frequently and increasing phone and zoom visits from home. Grief and NAMI support groups still have strong attendance. She welcomes input on how to keep Worship fresh. How we can improve? Leigh also led a 4-week discussion of Advent on Tuesday nights. Treasurer Jim Lilje reported that VPC is still in good financial condition. Donations exceed projections and nearly offset lost revenue from other building users. Pending Congregational approval of the Pastor's compensation package, which will be voted on at the Annual Meeting of the Congregation and Corporation January 24<sup>th</sup>, the budget for 2021 was adopted. Elizabeth Loveness reported Happy Holiday Hour was quite successful and included some participants that formerly had not been very involved. Tech support benefitted two members and succeeded just in time for several zoom events they were fully engaged in. Hospitality is looking at the possibility of purchasing two Chrome books to have as "loaners" for those who are having difficulty zooming with us. Session approved a motion that all money received during Bizarre Holiday Bazaar be donated to the IFCH Rent Relief Fund. Purposeful service elder Bob Spangler reported on the Mary's Place virtual Christmas Tree tag offering and publicizing the PCUSA Mission Giving Catalog for gifts made to mission causes. In lieu of the traditional Christmas Eve offering, it was suggested that during the services people be urged to donate individually to the causes they feel most worthy. The December styrofoam recycling event was cancelled due to COVID concerns. We will continue to publicize this program. Outreach elder Barb Huff volunteered to coordinate a first ever Christmas pageant via zoom. The book club held their annual book exchange also by zoom and discussed the book Wishin' and Hopin' by Wally Lamb. Brownie Carver reported the warm clothing drive went very well and items have distributed. Our matching funds challenge has also gone well with collections of almost at \$2500 at the time of the meeting. A thank you letter is being sent to the Seattle Presbytery for the \$2500 grant to the IFCH through an application initiated by VPC. Following an exchange of affirmations of Brownie Carver's service as Elder over the last 6 years the moderator closed with prayer. Session's next scheduled meeting will be Jan 19<sup>th</sup> at 4:30 pm via zoom.
