Dear Ones of VPC,

Part of the process of getting ready for in person worship involves the procurement of better technology. A few weeks ago, a few of us met with a young man that the Presbytery suggested for us. He came in, told us what we needed and will be setting it up for us soon. The Session voted on his proposal and unanimously approved the purchase of the equipment.

"Hybrid worship" is a term I hear frequently in my conversations with other clergy these days and yet one that I had never heard of until recently. Hybrid worship is the combination of in person worship while still keeping our virtual presence on Zoom and/or livestream. And everyone I have talked to about this concept is convinced that it is the only way to go forward for any of us.

These are some of the things I have learned from worship during Covid:

- Worship is life giving and we will find our way to be together however we can.
- Not everyone is able to come to the sanctuary for a variety of reasons. They may be traveling or sick. They may be struggling with issues that they prefer not to share.
- Not everyone is free on Sunday morning. I've heard from a number of folks both on Vashon and in the Greater Seattle area that they are watching our sermons posted online. Their jobs prevent them from being free on Sunday mornings. Many of them miss the church but don't see a way "in" given the constraints of their jobs.
- Our presence online is invitational to those who want to check out our worship without having to come into the building. For those with social anxiety, we become more assessable. They can "church shop" without being overwhelmed.


I am grateful to work with a forward-thinking Session that recognizes the importance of accessibility for others. And my hope is that "hybrid worship" is a launching point for other ways to meet others where they are. Five day a week jobs aren't everyone's truth, for example.

As we move forward together, I'm asking you to think about "hybrid" church and how we can be more inclusive in all areas of our congregational life. I believe God is asking us not to "return to worship" but to "launch into a new way of including others."

Thank you for your patience. Our electronics are arriving and will soon be installed. You will be invited to learn how to use them, to learn how to take your events, bible studies, forums, meetings, etc. into a new hybrid life. We can do this! We can do this together. Most importantly, we can do this with God's help.

Clerk's Corner

Session held its regular monthly meeting July 20th at Elizabeth Loveness' home. Elder Jim Lilje attended via Zoom. Pastor Leigh opened the meeting with prayer.

Re-entry discussion focused on allowing the sanctuary and other meeting rooms' use by outside groups and resuming in-person worship in the sanctuary. Cautiously approaching increased usage, Session increased the number of people allowed in the Upper Room to 10 and the sanctuary to unlimited, providing safe social distancing is maintained. All persons entering the building will continue to be required to sanitize their hands and remain masked while in the building.

Mission Resources Elder Jim Lilje, presented the Income and Expense report through June and cash on hand through second quarter. VPC continues to run ahead of budget and to show a positive cash flow thanks mainly to greater than budgeted donations. Mission partner donations continue as scheduled. Session approved allocating \$4,000 from the Mission Vision budget and \$2,952 from undesignated Memorial Fund donations to cover the cost of IT equipment purchase, installation, and training to facilitate hybrid worship services originating in the sanctuary. Session anticipates starting hybrid worship once the new IT equipment has been installed and becomes operational. Training for **anyone** wanting to learn to operate the IT equipment is scheduled for Friday, August 6th. Contact the office if interested.

Carpets and windows are scheduled to be cleaned in August after the yard sale and prior to the return of Carpe Diem and Creative Preschool children. The picnic/worship with Mary's Place at Ober Park will be postponed due to rising concerns of break through viral infections. Styrofoam recycling efforts will resume for the first Sunday in August with drop-off of small amounts at VPC on the preceding Saturday, July 31st. Yard sale plans are focusing on maintaining a COVID safe environment during the sale by limiting the number of browsers within designated outdoor areas. Session approved donating proceeds of the yard sale to Vashon Youth and Family Services. Faith Formation will reduce activities during the month of August. The series about the faith journeys of young adults will resume in September. Theology Pub and Text Study will continue as scheduled and be advertised in the weekly Enews.

Session's next scheduled meeting is August 17^{th} .

Faith Formation Ends 2021 Summer Session

"Youth and Their Faith Journeys"

The "Interview" class ran in June and July and ended its first series of interviews July 20. It has proved to be fascinating for teachers and class members alike. Thomas Abraham has provided invaluable help on these interviews. We've interviewed four young adults and now have a list to interview in our second series beginning in September. In the quest to answer the question "who's not here," the interviews have given us much insight.

What have we learned so far? The class is meant to be a chance for listening to young people talk about faith and how they integrate that into their busy lives. Of the four we've talked to so far (both in the pre interview session and the interview itself) we see these trends: Most do not attend a church service although most did when they were growing up. Many retreat to nature for inspiration. They find their social connections through groups other than church, e.g.nonprofits, work associates, family or community service organizations. Many have been disillusioned with the structure and exclusivity of the mainline churches. Some have been hurt deeply by the rigidity of conservative churches. Most want to find a meaningful way to express their faith or values regarding the world that is "bigger than themselves." They are searching to some degree for spiritual practices to give their lives more meaning, e.g.yoga. They are not seeking through organized churches. Most discuss these topics with only their closest friends. One described his journey as a "solo Christian." Most say that Jesus and His teaching is the good thing about the Christian church, not church doctrine or social construct. They are busy, perhaps too busy, to slow down enough to consider faith, God, religion, good/evil in the hyped-up media-driven world. They can be communicating with several people from around the world at any given moment. Most know history well enough to know Christian churches have been complicit in racism, wars, and social injustice. Most seek secular help for their problems via doctors, medications, therapists, counselors, friends.

No conclusions. These are just a few threads that seem to run through the younger generation's narrative. Join us in September for more "listening" in hopes of achieving greater understanding and empathy between the generations.

We have 5 very interesting and diverse young men and women who will be sharing their faith journey with us. If you would like to read something to prepare for our future interviews I have several copies of <u>The Reason for God</u> by Timothy Keller. There is also a study guide and DVD that we may use some to debrief our own interviews.

Save Your Grocery Receipts An Easy Way to Help our Community!

Do you know that your Thriftway and IGA grocery receipts can generate a donation directly to the church?

Through the Thriftway and IGA 1% Program, we receive a one percent rebate on all receipts that we turn in to them. To be considered, each receipt must include the shopper's name and telephone number. Almost all purchases are eligible for this rebate, with the exception of items with no profit such as stamps, newspapers, and gift cards.

Beverly Skeffington has taken on the painstaking job of totaling and turning in the receipts. Recently she turned in Thriftway receipts that will generate a rebate of \$115. We donate the proceeds from this program to the Vashon Food Bank.

Beverly does the hard part. All you need to do is write your name and your telephone number on your grocery receipts, save and bundle them, and turn them in. Easy as 1-2-3! You may drop them into the prayer box outside the church, or you may mail them to VPC, or if you are inside the church you may drop them into the designated boxes in the East Room. (Or simply hand them to Leigh the next time you see her!)
