A Message from Pastor Leigh

Dear Ones of VPC,

One of the holiday traditions we've always kept in our house is the lighting of the Advent candles on our wreath. I remember having to help them hold the long match when my kids were young. So, when I pulled the wreath out last week, I was flooded with those memories. I am also flooded with the awareness that this time of waiting is guite special.

As I watched Al light the first candle in worship last Sunday, I felt a sense of "Yes...this is what we do together." We wait together. Last year's Covid restrictions didn't stop Advent and Christmas, we still lit candles and waited together and yet there was something wonderful about watching that in person this year.

Rituals and traditions give us a framework, they create memories and connection and it's good to share those with one another. We find our way to honor those despite our circumstances because they point to something more. They point to the collective waiting that we do in this season. They slow us down. They make us ponder.

The rituals themselves are not what binds us but our collective understanding that we live in expectation not only of Christmas but of a new way. Theologian Dominic Crossan once said, "If you had been following Jesus' life day to day and how he lived you would probably have been thinking that someone is going to kill this man." The One for which we wait invites us to a way of living contrary to much of what the world values. He invites us to love without condition, to treat every human as a sacred person, to care for the sick and feed the hungry, to stand up and alongside those on the margins. He invites us to the work of it being done on earth as it is in heaven.

While I am filled with nostalgia and delight that we are lighting candles together once again, I am also aware that these candles which we light are signs of a birth that not only changed the world but invites us to be the change today.

So let us light candles and let us sing and let us pray and let us wait together but let us also remember that the One for whom we wait is also waiting for us.

In-Person Worship Guidelines

Due to the current guidelines from the King County Health Department, the concern over the delta variant and our need to create the safest possible space for everyone, we will follow these guidelines:

- We strongly recommend vaccination for Covid-19.
- Everyone attending in-person worship must wear a mask, in keeping with Washington State requirements (https://www.doh.wa.gov/Newsroom/Articles/ID/2901/Updated-statewide-masking-order).
- We will sing together.
- Pews will be clearly marked to allow safe distancing.
- Offerings will continue to be received online and by mail, but we will also have an offering plate up front for those who wish to contribute in person.
- We will share in communion. Bread will be placed on trays in individual paper holders and juice will be in little cups. We will not pass plates but come forward to receive the elements. If you prefer to bring your own elements you are welcome to do so.
- Bathrooms will be cleaned before and after worship by custodial staff.
- There will be a screen in the sanctuary to allow those in person to see who is worshipping with us on Zoom and to hear their prayer requests when possible.
- We will use the pew hymnals.
- Bulletins will be placed on the table outside the sanctuary doors. We will continue to email them on Saturdays.

The guidelines we have agreed upon as a Session are not meant to further divide or challenge anyone. They are simply our collective prayerful discernment about what is best for now. We will continue to strive to make the safest possible place for all to worship, in our sanctuary or in your home. And we look forward, with you and the whole world, to the end of this pandemic.

We are delighted to be able to worship together in person again as you are ready. Feel free to reach out to us, via the church's or Pastor Leigh's email if you have any questions or concerns.

Clerk's Corner

Session held its regular monthly meeting November 21st at Elizabeth Loveness' home. Pastor Leigh opened the meeting with prayer. Finance Elder Jim Lilje reported on the present financial status and expressed confidence that the church will end the year with slightly higher income than expenses. The foci (plural of focus) of the meeting were Advent and Christmas planning, activity of the nominating committee, revising Pastor Leigh's terms of call for 2022, and finalizing a budget for 2022.

A hybrid Christmas Eve candlelight service will be celebrated in person and via zoom at 5pm. We'll share desserts from home via zoom Christmas Day at 6pm and Sunday worship December 26th will be via zoom ONLY.

The nominating committee reported progress in filling both Elder and Deacon vacancies which will occur at the end of the year and the personnel committee proposed an increase in the pastor's terms of call.

Church Officers must be elected by vote of the congregation and their terms will begin January 1, 2022. Changes to a pastor's terms of call must be approved by vote of the congregation and reviewed by the Presbytery's commission on ministry before becoming effective. Therefore, a congregational meeting will be held on December 12th for election of church officers and approval of the proposed terms of call.

Session then adopted a budget which will be presented to the congregation at the Annual Meeting of the congregation and corporation in January.

Details of other committee activities discussed and approved will be listed in each committee's section of this newsletter

The next meeting of Session will be December 21st at 4pm at Elizabeth Loveness' home.

Building and Grounds

We've been busy this month having potholes in the parking lot filled, repairing leaking plumbing in the restrooms, having technicians perform the annual inspection of our fire alarms, equipment, and fresh water back-flow preventer, having the rain gutters cleaned and decorating the church for Christmas.

Hopefully during our Second Saturday work party on December 12th we can do a little more winterizing of the grounds and put final touches on Christmas decorations. Weather permitting, we'll gather at the church from 10-noon. I'm sure there will be work both indoors and outdoors. We can especially use any pickup trucks that can carry away some of the clippings we've been piling around the perimeter of the parking lot. Watch the eNews for updates.

Planning is still in the works to convert the "Joyful Noise" (crying) room to an audio/visual control room with A/V equipment set up permanently and secured in that space. If you have any ideas, please contact me.

You may prefer to shop for physical toys and presents for families from the holiday wish lists at Target or Amazon to purchase a gift for Mary's Place kids, teens, or parents, and ship them directly to Mary's Place. Visit the Giving Tree page at www.marysplaceseattle.org/givingtreetags to shop for gifts, or simply make a cash donation that will allow Mary's Place to directly purchase the toys or gift cards that are most wanted by the families.

Once you've made a gift to Mary's Place, you may want to consider something special for that hard to please relative or friend. How about a piglet (\$40) or a rainwater catchment system (\$75)? No, you don't actually send these gifts; rather you use the Presbyterian Giving Catalog (which has 20 pages of suggestions) and have the items sent to a needy recipient identified by our parent denomination. Faith Formation Report

About 14 members have started a daily devotional using the guide, <u>The One Year Through the Bible Devotional</u>. One can read a verse(s) each day and read in the guide a short passage for thought or prayer. We will have a time every two week for comment or questions. Our first gathering was November 16 on Zoom.

In addition, Presbytery is offering a special Advent devotional. Leigh suggests that we put <u>The One Year Devotional</u> on hold until the first of the year, and look at the Presbytery one during this season.

We also are starting a four-part Advent series, which is unusual and is a reminder of Christ's coming and mission here on earth. Using excerpts from a Presbyterian Relief Agency film, class members discuss disruptions to our lives and keeping the hope of Jesus's coming. This Advent series will be shared on Zoom four Tuesdays beginning November 30 at 7 pm.

We finished our listening interviews with the 25-30ish-year-olds. Some conclusions are given below. I was hoping class members would conclude from this that they should look for opportunities to reach out when and where they can - one on one. Conclusions about younger generation are:

- 1. Most do not attend a church service although most did when they were growing up.
- 2. Many retreat to nature for inspiration.
- 3. They find their social connections through groups other than church, such as nonprofits, work associates, family, or community service organizations.
- 4. Many have been disillusioned with the liturgical language, structure and exclusivity of the mainline churches.
- 5. Some have been hurt deeply by the rigidity of conservative churches.
- 6. Most want to find a meaningful way to express their faith or values regarding the world that is "bigger than themselves."
- 7. They are searching to some extent for spiritual practices such as yoga or meditation to give their lives more meaning and wholeness.
- 8. They are not seeking through organized churches.
- 9. Most discuss these topics with only their closest friends. One described his journey as a "solo Christian."
- 10. They are busy, perhaps too busy, to slow down enough to consider faith, God, religion, good/evil in the hyped-up media-driven world.
- 11. Most know history well enough to know Christian churches have been complicit in racism, wars, and social injustice.
- 12. Most seek secular help for their problems via doctors, medications, therapists, counselors, friends rather than from religion or Christian faith.

We had planned as a last class a reunion of all the interviewees so they could meet each other and comment on our conclusions, but it got too close to the holidays and we couldn't get a date that all or even several could be present at once, so I'm sending some of our conclusions to them to get their thoughts and comments.

Deacon's Message "Put on Your Own Oxygen Mask Before Helping Others"

Even though it might have been a while since you have boarded an airplane, no doubt you remember as part of the preflight safety instructions, the admonition to secure your own oxygen mask before assisting others with theirs. This rule is grounded in practicality. A dad who decides to strap a mask on his frightened and unruly toddler before securing his own could pass out before doing so, jeopardizing the safety of both.

This wisdom extends well beyond the confines of an aircraft, and is particularly applicable during the weeks leading up to Christmas. Just look at this month's busy church calendar to see that we have at least double the events and activities in December than just about any other time of the year. While this is a fun and festive time, it can also be a trap for those of us who want everything to be "just right." A perfectly trimmed Christmas tree; the home decked out with lights and decorations; gifts purchased, wrapped and shipped in time; cards printed, written and mailed; elaborate meals planned and prepared—you know how it goes.. The pressure to create the perfect Christmas experience can be overwhelming, particularly this year when many of us will reunite with our family. If we aren't mindful, we can easily find ourselves exhausted and counting the days until Christmas is *over!* And what a shame that would be.

Leigh mentioned in a recent sermon that we need to be gentler with ourselves during Advent. We need to remember the reason for the season. We don't honor God when we wear ourselves out in the name of Christmas.

If you are feeling the pressure to overextend your personal resources, remember that this pressure is not imposed by the Lord. We have permission to scale back, step back, and ask others for help. When we do that, we are in fact putting on our own oxygen mask first, ensuring that we have the strength and willingness to help others as God's hands and feet.
