A Message from Pastor Leigh

Dear Ones of VPC,

Do you remember the first time you stepped into the VPC building? For me it was my interview with the Pastor Nominating Committee one Sunday afternoon. Brownie thoughtfully looked through the window in the East Room to tell me which door to enter. We went into the library for our conversation and afterwards walked around the church.

Over the past few months, since returning to in-person worship, I've been thinking about that first day. I wouldn't have known where to park if I hadn't been given instructions or what door to use. Brownie was looking for me and it helped me know I was in the right place.

When people come to the church building for the first time, I wonder what they see. I am confident they see a friendly and welcoming congregation, but I wonder if they know where to go, where to put their coats, whether they are expected to give money, how should they dress, are their kids allowed to be noisy, what is with communion? I suspect if we put on our "first Sunday" way of thinking we might come up with a long list of questions.

These are the questions that I think we should be asking ourselves all the time. What do others, who don't have my long history with VPC, see when they come here and where might there be some gaps in our hospitality.

When we started the painting project these were some of the questions we had in mind? How does our space look? Cared for? Fresh? How does it smell? Musty? Fresh? What's the first thing people see in the first ten steps they take in our building? What does our signage say? Do they know where bathrooms are located? Do they know they are welcome, just as they are?

Throughout this spring and summer and into the future, I'd like to invite you to think like a first day person and help us see. Help us to pay attention. And help us to talk about what we notice.

Who are we, VPC? And what does our shared space say about that? Jesus said, "Let the little ones come to me and do not hinder them..." How do we clear the way? And what might we need to let go in order to do that?

Clerk's Corner

Session held its regular monthly meeting March 15 via Zoom. Pastor Leigh opened the meeting with prayer. She is planning vacation April 18[°] April 24. Reverend Dr. Bruce Baker has agreed to fill the pulpit on April 24. Leigh reported there is increased interest by other island clergy to coordinate services, share pulpits and combine efforts in ecumenical events such as a Vacation Bible School. Services are planned for each night of Holy Week at 5:00 PM. Services on Sunday through Wednesday will be via Zoom only. Thursday and Friday services will be hybrid. Beth Bekkevold's memorial service will be held via Zoom at the family's request on April 2.

Electronic statements of cash on hand as of end of February and year-to-date income and expenditures versus budget were reviewed. Motions to renew a contract for the 2022-2023 school year with Carpe Diem at the same rental rate as last year and to Vashon-Maury Cooperative Preschool at the rental rate Creative Preschool had paid in 2021-2022 were approved. Both the Session and Cooperative preschool are very excited about the opportunity to begin a long-term relationship.

Purchases of a 6' and an 8' lightweight folding table were approved. If found sturdy enough, the heavy rectangular tables now used for coffee hours and yard sales will be replaced with light weight plastic tables. With Session approval, the Mission Resources group will coordinate painting and remodeling of the Main Street Entry, Narthex, and East Room by Easter.

The Hospitality group has resumed hosting coffee fellowship in the East Room after worship. A reception following Diana Spaulding's memorial March 5 expected a turnout of about 35 people; instead, over 60 attended. Future events were presented for discussion.

Purposeful Service will continue promoting the One Great Hour of Sharing offering to be received by Palm Sunday, styrofoam and plastics collection on April 2' and the Heindsmann Scholarship.

Game Night continues to be well attended. Around 25 pies were shared on Pi Day by church members and a variety of islanders. First Friday bonfires will resume April 1, and a bunny chute for distribution of candy to youngsters (as we employed at Halloween and Winterfest) at our Easter egg hunt are being planned.

Faith Formation: Pastor Leigh is leading a Lenten discussion group on Tuesday evenings via Zoom reading <u>Entering the Passion of Jesus</u>. After Lent the group will return to reading <u>Following the Call</u>.

Details of all committee activities are listed in each committee's section of this newsletter. Due to Pastor Leigh's April vacation, the next regular session meeting will be May 9th at 7pm via zoom.

Ecumenical Sunrise Easter Service – 6:15 Easter Morning, April 17

Sunrise over Quartermaster Harbor set in the lush spring splendor of Camp Burton is an inspirational way to begin your celebration of the Risen Lord. We join with our brothers and sisters from the Methodist church in leading an ecumenical gathering around the campfire and sharing fish as it might have been done in Jesus's time. For me, this has been a most meaningful way to share God's love here on the island.

Holy Week – Easter!

April brings springtime in the Pacific Northwest, and to us Christians our most important holiday. During Lent Pastor Leigh has been taking us step by step through Holy Week with her sermons from the Gospel of John and the Faith Formation class study of <u>Entering the Passion of Jesus</u> by Amy-Jill Levine. We have looked deeply at the major players, their motives, and their fears.

So as we enter Holy Week again this year, we can feel a deeper meaning of the crowds cheering Hosanna ("Save me") on Palm Sunday. Sunday through Wednesday evenings we will share in Evening Prayer, reading scripture and having a time of prayer and music. Thursday, April 14 we will *celebrate* with a Maundy Thursday communion service combined with Vashon Lutheran. Good Friday will be our traditional Tenebrae service. All services will be at 5:00 PM, with Thursday and Friday both in person and on Zoom. Sunday-Wednesday evenings will be Zoom only.

Purposeful Service Team Areas of Responsibility

Scholarships, Mary's Place partnership, IFCH, Mission Partner Relations

The process for awarding the Heindsmann scholarship is underway! Bev Skeffington is leading a small group that is publicizing the scholarship and will interview applicants and recommend an applicant. The scholarship is not intended for high school seniors; rather, preference is given to those with several years of college or trade school, or for those returning to post-high school study after starting a career. Applications will be available in the VPC office starting April 4, with a deadline of April 28. Please tell friends and family about this opportunity. **See details regarding qualification and approval process on the following page.**

We will be collecting plastic bags, bubble mailers, Styrofoam and other packing material at the VPC parking lot on Saturday, April 2 at **3:00 pm** (note departure from usual time). Help Vashon keep this non-degradable stuff out of our landfill! The organizers ask neighbors and groups to combine collections to reduce traffic at the site. If you prefer to take your material directly, the hours at the Sheffield Building are 10 am - 4 pm on Sunday April 3.

Our parent denomination sponsors four annual nationwide special offerings. VPC has regularly participated in the first offering: One Great Hour of Sharing. This offering, collected during Lent, is distributed almost equally among three programs: Presbyterian Disaster Assistance (above), Presbyterian Hunger Program and Self-development of People. For those in our community who attend worship in person, more information about these programs will be available in bulletin inserts. Those not attending may pick up copies in the east room during office hours or visit the PCUSA website: <u>https://specialofferings.pcusa.org/offering/oghs/</u>. Our parent denomination is also conducting a special collection for Ukraine refugee relief. See the weekly e-news for details.

April 3 is Food Bank Sunday. Bring non-perishable food items and personal hygiene supplies to VPC and leave them in the collection box at the back of the sanctuary.

Brownie Carver, VPC's representative to Interfaith Council to Prevent Homelessness, reports that the IFCH subsidized rent program gave rent to 34 households for 2022, of which 29% are seniors. VPC donates \$250 each quarter to support IFCH's ministry.

Heindsmann Family Endowment Scholarship General Information

The Scholarship Committee of the Vashon Presbyterian Church of Vashon, Washington, annually awards the Heindsmann Family Endowment Scholarship. The scholarship is funded by an endowment created by the late Ted and Virginia Heindsmann and is awarded to a deserving student, based on financial need, academic promise, and dependability, who has **completed two or more years** of higher education or is seeking special training or retraining.

The following rules govern the award of the Heindsmann Family Endowment Scholarship:

- 1. The Scholarship is not limited to applicants attending any one college, university, or technical school nor those pursuing a particular course of study.
- 2. The Scholarship will usually be offered to a student affiliated with Vashon Presbyterian Church, but this rule is not binding.
- 3. The Scholarship Committee will determine annually the number of Scholarships awarded and the amount of each award.
- 4. Consideration will be given only to
 - a. students currently enrolled in a school of higher education who have completed two years and are planning to return to school in the Fall or
 - b. an individual who has the desire to return to a college, university, or technical school after an absence.

The scholarship is not open to high school seniors!

- 5. The decision of naming the recipient of the Scholarship rests with the Scholarship Committee.
- 6. The Scholarship will be awarded on the basis of the following items:
 - a. Financial need
 - b. Academic promise
 - c. Dependability
 - d. Intent of the student to continue an education at a college, university, or technical school.
- 7. Completed application packets must be returned via email or to the church by Thursday, April 28, 2022. Finalists will be scheduled to meet with the church's Scholarship Committee in May. The presentation of the award will be made during a Zoom Worship Service that will be announced in the future.
