A Message from Pastor Leigh

Dear Ones of VPC,

A couple of years into our marriage, my husband and I lived in the town of Burlington, NC. It's a charming little southern town with sidewalks and older, restored homes that feel a bit like Mayberry. We rented one side of a duplex in a 1940's craftsman home that was short on square footage but big on charm. The thing I loved the most was the front porch, wide swept with a porch swing and wide concrete steps that invited folks to "sit for a spell."

Of all the places we lived in those first few years of being married it was there that we got to know our neighbors the best. We waved and chatted on warm summer evenings, talked about the humidity, and engaged in just being with others in a way that our other traditional apartments didn't allow.

The front porch was much like the one at VPC, older concrete steps inviting folks to "sit for a spell." It's why I believe our "Front Porch Outreach" is at the heart of what we do. After a wet and rainy winter and spring, sweeping off the porch and putting out some chairs feels like welcome relief.

In the same way that Jesus and his disciples would sit around a fire at night engaging in stories, deep listening and just sitting together, we can do the same. From First Fridays to Strawberry Festival Weekend, to the Yard Sale, we are sweeping off the porch and making space to sit with one another.

I'm encouraging you to find ways and times when you can be on the porch, waving at the neighbors, talking about the weather, welcoming friends and just being together this summer. Barb Huff, your Outreach Elder, and I would welcome the conversation, the support, and the friendship of this time. It's time to dust off the lawn games, buy the marshmallows, make some lemonade, and enjoy the summer on the porch. This is ministry!

It's good to hear the piano talent of Jan van Roessel and more reflection music from Thomas Abraham. They are giving some of our regulars a summer break. As the year progresses, we will continue to give high priority to music in the worship service.

We are all lamenting the disappearance of the beautiful, hand quilted banner from the church sometime in April or May. If anyone has information leading to finding the banner, please let Pastor Leigh or Brownie Carver know ASAP.

Presbytery Report

Barb Huff, Pastor Leigh and I attended the June 21 Presbytery meeting via Zoom. The first order of business was the reading of the following Land Acknowledgement:

The Presbytery of Seattle recognizes that we are on stolen land. As an organization with dozens of properties, we occupy the traditional territories of the Coast Salish people. This includes the Duwamish People, past, present and future, whom we recognize as the original stewards of the land.

Chief Si'ahl and Native leaders reluctantly signed the Treaty of Point Elliott on January 22, 1855. All Tribes represented at the signing were guaranteed services, hunting and fishing rights, and reservations in exchange for over 54,000 acres of the Duwamish Tribe's homeland. To this day, Treaty promises made by the U.S. government to the Duwamish have not been honored.

As we acknowledge the city of Seattle's true history, it is our responsibility to continue to:

- Understand our position in relation to the lands we occupy
- Disrupt Indigenous erasure, colonization, and oppression
- And honor the cultural heritages of Indigenous community members

In remembering and truth telling, we are committed to honoring Indigenous peoples and their stories across the US and seek ways to engage in authentic relationship building and community collaboration as part of our witness to the Gospel.

Following prayer and welcoming of new commissioners and members we were joined via Zoom with delegates from Seattle Presbytery who are attending the 225th General Assembly which is meeting in Louisville, Kentucky and hybrid via Zoom. Each of the delegates updated us about the work being done in the committees to which they have been assigned.

Reverend Tali Hairston next led a period of Holy Conversation. The focus of the discussion was a podcast provided prior to the meeting by the Colombia Mission Partnership about how our relationship has grown since inception in 2014. Breakout rooms allowed five or six attendees to discuss aspects of the podcast in small groups and then bring ideas generated back to the larger meeting. Following the Holy Conversation, reports were received from the Co-Executive Presbyters, the Executive Board, Thriving Congregations, the Stated Clerk, the First Presbyterian Church of Seattle (FPCS) Administrative Commission (AC)/Session, the Commission on Ministry (COM), and finally from the Commission on Preparation for Ministry (CPM) presented by Pastor Leigh Weber.

I encourage all of you to visit the Seapres website listed above for detailed reports and to stay informed of all the good work going on in this presbytery and the General Assembly. The next Stated Meeting of Presbytery will be October 18th at 5:00 PM

Deacon's Message

"It is not right that we should neglect the word of God in order to wait on tables."

I don't remember the occasion, but the pastor in whose home a group of us were meeting half a lifetime ago said "I think the apostles were wrong about that." For him, "waiting on tables" was no less important than "prayer" and "serving the word," which the apostles understood as their priorities.

What led to the apostles' view, Acts 6 says, was a complaint about unequal distribution of food to people in need in the early church. A group of seven was chosen to ensure a more equitable sharing of resources. The role of the seven seems to have developed into the group of people in many churches today known as deacons. "Deacon" comes from the Greek word for servant.

I meet on Zoom every week with a group of men. We're currently reading and discussing the early chapters of Acts. Here are some observations and questions by members of the group that speak to waiting on tables versus (not) neglecting the word of God:

-- Stephen, one of the seven, is a powerful speaker as well as a "wonder / miracle" worker, "full of the Spirit and of wisdom . . . of faith . . . of grace and power". We learn nothing about his "waiting on tables." When he is dragged by Hellenist Jews before the Jewish religious authorities, his speech displays a grasp of Jewish Scriptures, the formative history of Israel, and the covenant, most of which his accusers and listeners probably agree with. Instead of defending himself, he abruptly accuses his listeners. Their rage turns murderous when he shares his vision of Jesus.

Is this deacon material?

-- Philip, another of the seven, is also proclaiming the word in a / the city of Samaria. His words are accompanied by "signs" and "great miracles." He goes on to proclaim the good news about Jesus to the Ethiopian queen's treasurer, who is "reading the prophet Isaiah" in his chariot on his way home from Jerusalem. Philip baptizes the new believers in both locations and then makes his way to Caesarea, a city on the Mediterranean.

We meet Philip again, when Paul (present, as Saul, at Stephen's death) and others to whom Luke refers as "we" stop at Caesarea on their way to Jerusalem. Is it because this deacon too did not "neglect the word" that he is identified there as Philip the evangelist?

"What deacons aren't," panelists at the September 2021 PCUSA Year of Leadership Formation webinar on deacon ministries agreed, "is a single thing. Deacons serve inside and outside their congregations, in ways that respond to the different contexts of their communities."

Is "waiting on tables" also a service of the word? Or does the service of the word preclude waiting on tables? I see a model in our pastor, Leigh. While worship, preaching and teaching--often associated with the service of the word-- are clearly among her key responsibilities, she does not neglect "waiting on tables."


VPC Book Club

The Book Club selection for July is <u>Jesus and the Disinherited</u> by Howard Thurman. According to Amazon, "Famously known as the text that Martin Luther King Jr. sought inspiration from in the days leading up to the Montgomery bus boycott, Howard Thurman's *Jesus and the Disinherited* helped shape the civil rights movement and changed our nation's history forever.

In this classic theological treatise, the acclaimed theologian and religious leader Howard Thurman (1900-1981) demonstrates how the gospel may be read as a manual of resistance for the poor and disenfranchised. Jesus is a partner in the pain of the oppressed and the example of His life offers a solution to ending the descent into moral nihilism. Hatred does not empower--it decays. Only through self-love and love of one another can God's justice prevail."

Food Bank Sunday July 3

It's the first of a new month - time for Communion and Food Bank donations. Increasing food prices are affecting everyone. The Food Bank is challenged by their commitment to provide support for over 250 Vashon families every week - as well as about 200 daily lunches in the park during the summer.

They've offered us some ideas for donations: peanut butter, pasta, rices, ramen noodles, and soups (especially chicken noodle) are always useful. Tuna, canned stews and chili are always welcome, too. Think of condiments: salt, pepper, mustard, olives, pickles, salsa, ketchup and fun foods for summer meals. Ingredients for baking are always in short supply too: cooking oil, sugar, cake mixes etc. For the foods that are limited, special donations are offered to the clients on Wednesdays when they set up a marketplace.

In addition to food, there is a need for other necessities such as toilet paper, feminine hygiene products, and diapers.

Please consider bringing a donation to church next Sunday or leave your donations any time in the blue storage cupboard at the Food Bank. It's outside across the parking lot (to the south) from the main office at Sunrise Ridge.
