A Message from Pastor Leigh

Dear Ones of VPC,

Like lots of people, I grew up with the trusty Sears catalog that arrived in the mail each fall. It would always be wrapped in plastic and my mother would have to go around to the front desk at the post office because it didn't fit in our post office box. I couldn't wait to get home and start pouring over the pages, circling those things that I wanted to make sure Santa knew were of the highest priority to me. And then the waiting would begin. What would it be? Which ones would be under the tree? How many more days?

Waiting and Christmas go hand in hand and when I was little, I'll admit it was largely focused on the treasures I saw in that catalog and my hope that some of them would find their way to our tree. Back then the season seemed to move too slowly and now it often moves far too quickly. I find my own desire to slow it down, to lean into the waiting, to experience a preparation of my heart to engage this miracle of love.

Worship and Advent

Sunday, November 27 was the official beginning of Advent 2022. In this season of waiting and anticipation we observe some traditional and sometimes unique worship devotions to wait for and welcome the birth of Jesus on Christmas. As we come together for the Sunday service we are asking the young people of the church to light the Advent candles, embellished by their accompanying readings. Also we will celebrate Communion each Sunday of Advent with our members as well as people of faith throughout the world.

Pastor Leigh has emailed the Advent daily devotional, Kindling the Flame of Love – A Celtic Advent Devotional, and each one is encouraged to set aside some time to read, pray and absorb the feelings and full meaning of the of the season. The Tuesday Faith Formation class will focus on the Advent lessons taken from The Heart That Grew Three Sizes by Matt Rawle. More will be said about this in the article from the Faith Formation committee.

There will be a Christmas Eve Service for the whole community on the 24th. Our Hospitality Committee will begin serving holiday treats and hot beverages at 4:15 to welcome anyone who wishes to join us at VPC. The service begins at 5:00 PM. There will be a shortened Christmas Day Zoom-Only service at 10:00 AM on the 25th. It will last about 40 minutes. There will be a full Zoom-Only service on New Year's Day at 10:00 AM.

Clerk's Corner

Session held its regular monthly meeting November 15th in the Social Hall at VPC. Lindsay Hofman opened the meeting with a reading from <u>Praying with the Body</u> by Roy DeLeon and a prayer.

A Congregational meeting has been called by Session to elect church officers and vote on revised Terms of Call for Pastor Leigh Weber following Worship on December 11, 2022. All are invited to attend but only members will be allowed to vote.

Pastor Leigh has made significant improvements to our webpage. Session also approved contracting with Hummingbird Marketing Services for website redesign and maintenance. Pastor Leigh will lead the Faith Formation class during Advent using <a href="https://doi.org/10.1007/jhe-10.10

Worship Elder Elizabeth Loveness circulated a congregational survey for personalizing Advent Worship services. Session approved a motion to conduct hybrid (in-person and Zoom) worship at 5:00 PM on Christmas Eve. Worship service on Christmas Day and New Year's Day will be held via Zoom only.

Outreach Elder Barb Huff is coordinating the First Friday S'mores with the VPC outdoor tree lighting on December 2nd. She is also working with local artists to host a Christmas Bazaar on December 3rd, and is also working on our annual Christmas Pageant, which will be performed on December 18th following worship.

Hospitality Elder Nancy Tucker proposed a Christmas music singalong for the congregation.

Finance Elder Jim Lilje provided electronic statements of cash on hand, year-to-date vs budget as of November 30th and a revised draft budget for 2023 which was discussed and amended. Session expects to finalize the budget in December after the Congregation votes on the proposed changes to Pastor's Terms of Call.

The next regular session meeting will be Tuesday, December 20th at 4:30 pm, at Elizabeth Loveness' home.

The Session has approved a donation of \$1,000 from the general fund to Renton Ecumenical Association of Churches (REACH). As described in the November newsletter, REACH is a Renton-area community-based organization that provides shelter and navigation services for families transitioning intopermanent housing. This is the last of our Mission Partner donations for 2022; we will describe the 2023 program when the budget is presented at the Annual Meeting.

Members of the Purposeful Service committee will collect plastic bags, Styrofoam, bubble mailers and other plastic items in the VPC parking lot on Saturday December 3rd from 10:00 to 11:30 AM. The collection will be taken to the island-wide event the next day. Please save and bring this non-degradable material so that we can keep it out of the island landfill and have it put to good use. Plastic beverage bottles and clam shell food containers are accepted at the landfill and should be recycled there.

During the year you may have seen copies of the Presbyterian Giving Catalog in the East Room. December is an opportune month to take a copy and buy an item selected by our parent denomination for distribution where there is a need. The options are many (piglet, chickens etc.) and the gift amount range is wide. E-cards or regular gift cards can be requested if you buy the item as a gift for someone.

Closer to home is another gifting opportunity for the holiday season. The Vashon Care Network will be delivering boxes of items directly to our adult housing communities, and requests that VPC and other churches help them to bring comfort and care to our adult island neighbors. Please consider a donation of new socks, gloves, hats, scarves, coffee, tea, cookies, candy, and comfort items by using the box in the East Room.

Food Bank Sunday is December 4th. Please bring non-perishable food and personal hygiene items to the sanctuary and leave in the back pew or bring items to the church office during office hours.

Building and Grounds

The Second Saturday work party on November 12th cleaned trash around the parking lot and removed the worn-out carpet in the basement hallway. Plans are to sand down the glue remnants and coat the floor with waterproof epoxy.

Hilary Emmers and I installed a concrete slab on the north side of the church adjacent to the memorial patio on October 27th in preparation for installing a bench in memory of Rande and Jadzia Stevens.

Also, on the 22nd, Artisen Electric replaced a failed Inverter on the solar system under warranty at no cost. I'm scheduling an inspection and bid from them for installing additional interior electrical outlets in various locations and exterior electrical outlets near the front porch.

All fire alarms and equipment were inspected Wednesday, November 23rd.

As the lawn growth slows down, Aldo Flores and his crew are taking on other tasks that volunteers have not been able to keep up with. On November 18th, they dug up a couple of the dead rhododendrons on the north side of the church and trimmed back the shrubs bordering that flower bed. Their next project will be removing moss from the roof and installing zinc strips along the ridge line to inhibit future moss growth.

Other upcoming volunteer projects include continuing to pick up trash around the parking lot and replacing the fence between the front lawn and Zamorana's restaurant.

Presbytery Report

Pastor Leigh and I attended the in-person Presbytery meeting on October 18th at Mercer Island Presbyterian Church. This was the first in-person meeting of the Presbytery in over two years due to COVID restrictions. It was truly a joyous reunion and celebration of new initiatives. New commissioners and guests were welcomed and the following Land Acknowledgement and Commitment to One Another were read into the record by Vice Moderator, Reverend Dr. J.P. Kang.

Land Acknowledgement

The Presbytery of Seattle recognizes that we are on stolen land. As an organization with dozens of properties, we occupy the traditional territories of the Coast Salish people. This includes the Duwamish People, past, present, and future, whom we recognize as the original stewards of the land.

Chief Si'ahl and Native leaders reluctantly signed the Treaty of Point Elliott on January 22, 1855. All tribes represented at the signing were guaranteed services, hunting and fishing rights, and reservations in exchange for over 54,000 acres of the Duwamish Tribe's homeland. To this day, Treaty promises made by the U.S. government to the Duwamish have not been honored. As we acknowledge the city of Seattle's true history, it is our responsibility to continue to:

- Understand our position in relation to the lands we occupy;
- Disrupt Indigenous erasure, colonization, and oppression;
- And honor the cultural heritages of Indigenous community members.

In remembering and truth telling, we are committed to honoring indigenous peoples and their stories across the U.S. and seek ways to engage in authentic relationship building and community collaborationas part of our witness to the Gospel.

Presbytery Commitment to One Another

As Ruling and Teaching Elder members of the Presbytery of Seattle and the wider PC(USA), we accept Christ's call to be involved responsibly in the leadership of the church, and with God's help, commit ourselves to expected standards of ethical conduct:

- Show respect and provide encouragement for colleagues in ministry.
- Honor the sacred trust of relationships within the covenant community and observe appropriate boundaries.
- Be judicious in the exercise of the power and privileges of my office and positions of responsibility.

Together as the body of Christ we will work, discern, and lead honoring one another and the will ofGod.

The Annual Necrology Report followed, listing all Elders and Deacons who had passed away in 2021. This was followed with a period of silence and a prayer by the moderator.

Holy Conversations

Reverends. Maggie Breen and Paul Kim spoke to the idea that no congregation exists in isolation, but are instead a part of a community, and that we should take advantage of that relationship. The commissioners, discussed the following questions:

- 1. How does your congregation practice understanding its social and cultural context?
- 2. Is it central to the worship life of the church or decentralized?
- 3. Describe the time and/or resources put into learning the social and cultural context of its communities?
- 4. Consider the impact on a congregation that has integrated the social and cultural context into its worship life.

Following the Holy Conversations, reports were received from the Nominating Committee, Co-Executive Presbyters, the Executive Board, the Stated Clerk, the First Presbyterian Church of Seattle (FPCS) Administrative Commission, the Commission on Ministry (COM), and finally from the Commission on Preparation for Ministry (CPM). Both Pastor Leigh and I presented reports from our respective Commissions.

I encourage all of you to visit the Presbytery website (www.seattlepresbytery.org) for detailed reports and to stay informed of all the good work going on in this presbytery and the General Assembly. All are invited to attend all meetings, although only the pastor and two commissioners appointed by our Session are allowed to vote.

There was also a Special Called Meeting via Zoom only on Tuesday November 15th to consider approval of the proposed constitutional changes from the 225th General Assembly. Pastor Leigh and Barb Huff attended virtually. Results of the virtual vote have not been released yet.
